RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF PROTECTING ARIZONA'S STATE RIGHTS

- WHEREAS, the 10th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States reads: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people". Proposition 122 having passed into law, has become a "mandate" for Legislators and the Governor to pass laws supporting the 10th Amendment.
- THEREFORE, be it Resolved by the Maricopa County Republican Party, that the State of Arizona shall claim sovereignty under the 10th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States over all powers not otherwise enumerated and granted to the federal government by the United States Constitution and that this resolution shall serve as notice and demand to the federal government to cease and desist, effective immediately, mandates that are beyond the scope of its constitutionally delegated powers.
- THEREFORE, be it further Resolved that, pursuant to the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights, the Arizona State Legislature and Governor shall pass and sign into law, legislation including but not limited to: 1) Pro-4th Amendment protection from warrantless spying by Federal and State agencies on U.S. citizens, 2) Pro-"Sheriff's first" laws asserting constitutional jurisdiction over federal agencies, 3) Pro-"property rights" laws to protect Arizona Citizens from unconstitutional federal land acquisitions, 4) Pro-2nd Amendment laws, 5) Anti-Affordable Care Act laws, 6) Any legislation SPECIFICALLY PROTECTING "due process" and the Bill of Rights.
